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Briefing 30: Tuesday 15th September, 2020.

Dear friends,

Elton John once sang that 'sorry seems to be the hardest word.' And that does seem to be the case. Very often if public figures are caught doing something illegal, stupid or immoral, what flows from their mouths is not 'I'm sorry. I was wrong.' But a long list of excuses and reasons why they did as they did. 'I was under a great deal of pressure at the time. I'd had too much to drink. I was given bad advice. Somebody made me do it!' In fact, often they speak for ages and ages without ever saying the word sorry.

Then there are other times when people say sorry for the hurt that they have caused, or the difficulty they have caused for their colleagues, or the embarrassment they have brought to their families, without ever apologising for the act itself! That is using the word sorry to mean something entirely different. That's expressing regret for the consequences of their actions, not apologising for the actions themselves. Again, that is not an apology. It's not saying sorry. So why is sorry often the hardest word?

I think it is because the word sorry includes with it a clear admittance of wrongdoing or of moral failure. Saying sorry means that they have admitted doing something that they ought not to have done, and that implies weakness, that there is something wrong not just with what they've done, but with them.

Sadly though, we can't simply point the finger at others. Christians too, can struggle to admit their sin, and fail to take full responsibility for it. And that's strange, because right there, in the middle of the Lord's Prayer, comes the line 'forgive us our sins.' Saying sorry to God, asking for his forgiveness, is fundamental to being in relationship with God and being a Christian. Yet still we try and excuse ourselves. Still we try and blame others for our failings.

But if we come to God with that attitude and try and justify our own actions, we will go away having not been forgiven. Receiving forgiveness from God requires a full confession to God of our wrongdoing. It means admitting the wrongness of what we have done and taking full responsibility for it.

Perhaps it's the fear of the consequences of admitting our guilt and asking for forgiveness that stops us saying the words. For a politician at risk of losing their job, or a sportsman at risk of losing their sponsors, that kind of admission of weakness and failure can be very costly. But the failure to ask for God's forgiveness is far more costly still.

For the unbeliever, the failure to come to God in full confession and to ask for God's forgiveness is to stay outside God's kingdom and to remain eternally condemned. For the believer, the failure to come to God and confess our continued failure to live as we should and to ask for his forgiveness, leads to us missing out on the intimacy of a warm relationship with our Heavenly Father. What's more without true confession we will never change, nor grow in faith, nor grow in holiness. Those things all begin when we say and mean this part of the Lord's Prayer.

What's more, in both cases the failure to ask for God's forgiveness is self-destructive and means that we miss out on God's grace. God will never turn a repentant sinner away. He is more willing to forgive than we are to ask. His mercy is new every morning. His love is unceasing. And no matter how often we fail, still the promise of Scripture is that when we confess our sins, God is faithful to his promises, and will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. The blood of Jesus is powerful enough to wash away every sin. So let's not fail to confess our failings, deliberate or accidental. Let's be honest before God and receive his liberating pardon, and draw close to him again.

How might you pray 'forgive us our sins? Why not start with something like this...

Heavenly Father, I confess that I have sinned against you in my thoughts, my words and my deeds. There are good things I haven't done which I should have done. There are many things I shouldn't have done, which I have. By your Holy Spirit, bring them to mind now that I might name them before you now...

I'm sorry for them all. Please forgive me. I know I don't deserve it, but Jesus died in my place, taking the punishment I rightly deserve from my sin. Wash me clean, change my heart, and help me to live differently and not to fall into the same sins again and again. Thank you for hearing my prayer and for your forgiveness. Amen.
