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#### Briefing 95: Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> December, 2021.

Dear friends,

We've now finished our Advent series on the character of the coming King and have been reminded that our coming King is holy, loving, almighty and gentle. What will you take away from those talks, I wonder? A greater awareness of God's holiness and your own failings- but a greater thankfulness for God's saving love? A deeper and humbling appreciation of the power and authority of Jesus, and a deeper sense of God's gracious gentleness towards us?

Of course, underpinning all those characteristics are the assumptions that the Bible is true, that Jesus is God and that one day he will come back to judge and rule and reign. I take those things as certain, I hope you do too, and I'd argue that we have a strong basis of evidence, not least in history, to believe those things to be true. I wouldn't be a Christian without believing those things to be true. I wouldn't be a Vicar without believing those things. I wouldn't live as I do, act as I do, spend as I do, without believing those things. They impact every area of my life, although if I'm honest, perhaps not as much as they should and I pray that will continue to increase over the coming year.

But are those kinds of sacrifice worth it? One of my favourite films which will undoubtedly be on somewhere over Christmas is Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade. It centres around the search for the Holy Grail, the cup Jesus was supposed to have used at the last supper. Legend says that it's a cup with healing properties, a legend Indy's father believes but that our hero doubts. But with his father shot and dying, he is forced to consider what he truly believes. Will Indy risk his own life to secure the cup and perhaps save his dad? Or sit and do nothing?

Alongside my daily Bible reading I'm currently reading a book called '**Eternity Changes Everything**' by Stephen Witmer. It's a book I try to read every year or so, because it reminds me to look past the things of this world, fading and temporary as they are, and to consider this life, my life, my work, my faith in the light of eternity; in the light of the return and reign of Jesus. One question stood out from my chapter this morning: **Would you give up anything now for something that** <u>won't</u> **happen later**?

The answer is obvious isn't it. **Of course not**. No one would buy a ticket for a concert that is certain not to happen. Or book a holiday with flights that were sure to crash. And no matter how much we loved a person; we would not risk our lives to save them if it was certain that there was no hope of success. If there's a chance, we **might** take the risk. But if there is no chance. It's simply not worth bothering with.

In the same way, if Jesus isn't coming back. If he isn't God. If the Bible isn't true. If death is the end. If the Christmas story is just a fairy-tale, then we are wasting our time celebrating Jesus' birth, and wasting our time coming to church, and reading our Bibles and serving and giving in all the ways we do. We'd be better to live life for now.

But if the child in the manger IS God. If the Bible IS true. If Jesus IS coming back. If we CAN find full forgiveness and have eternal life through faith in him. Then surely no sacrifice is too much to give, no devotion is too great, no witness too foolhardy, no embarrassment too great, no hope too strong and no celebration of the truth of the gospel too joyful, because the eternal hope we have in Jesus is so extraordinarily wonderful!

What makes no sense to me is a half-hearted, hedge-your-bets kind of attitude where our Christian faith is more like a touch wood, cross-our-fingers, hope for tomorrow. It's either true or it isn't. It's worth everything we have, our absolute undivided devotion, or it's worth nothing. Of course, if we don't really know God or the gospel because we don't know our Bibles and rarely come to church, then perhaps a weak insipid faith is the best we can hope for. But such a life is a pale imitation of a true Christian life where through faith in our holy, loving, almighty and gentle saviour we receive real hope, deep peace and a lasting joy that makes the celebration of Jesus' birth truly worth celebrating.

Is the Christmas story true? Absolutely. Is Jesus LORD of all; is he really coming back as judge and king? Yes, he is! Can we trust him, whatever the cost, wherever he leads us? Yes. In life and in death. The question is, will you?
