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Briefing 99: Wednesday 26th January, 2022.

Dear friends,

We turn again to Philippians 1 verse 6 for some encouragement in pursuing the things of God and seeking to grow in faith and Christ-likeness: 'I am confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.'

Last week we noted how we can be confident that growth will happen and that change will come, because of the change that God has already wrought in us through faith in Jesus. Since we are now in Christ, these things are naturally part of the life of the true disciple of Jesus. Today our focus is on God's faithfulness- that he always finishes what he starts- no matter how long things take.

So think of Abram. God called this childless, elderly wandering Aramean to follow him and promised that he would become the head of a great nation, too numerous to count, who would inhabit a land flowing with milk and honey. He was 75 when God gave him that promise. He was 100 years old before Isaac, the child of the promise, was born. And it was generations later that his line became a great nation and conquered the Promised Land. But what God began, he sees through to completion. So it was with Abraham, so it will be with us.

Think of David. The young shepherd boy anointed King while Saul was still very much on the throne. Through his victory over Goliath and his military prowess, David's fame and renown grew, along with Saul's jealousy. Forced to flee for his life, it looked like God's promises would come to nothing. But God finishes what he starts. He always keeps his promises. So it was with David, so it will be with us.

Think of the great Old Testament prophets, men like Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel. Although much of their writing is taken up with warnings to God's Old Testament people about God's anger over their sin and the coming judgement unless they repent, they also pointed forward to the coming Messiah: The Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace. Their words of prophecy, predicting Christ's arrival were given hundreds of years before Jesus' birth. Yet every one of those prophecies came true. Jesus, the Messiah finally came because God finishes what he starts. He always keeps his promises. So it was with the Old Testament prophecies about Jesus, so it will be with us.

And then think of the life of Jesus, particularly his 3 ½ years of ministry: Healing the sick, calming the storm, feeding the hungry, forgiving the sinner, raising the dead, bringing comfort, hope freedom and new life. The Gospels give us a glimpse into the mindset of the disciples and the crowds, how they thought Jesus was the one, how they thought God's kingdom would be established through him, and how devastated they were, how broken, bereft of hope they were, as Jesus was arrested, tortured, crucified and buried. In the darkness of Good Friday and Easter Saturday, it looked as if God's salvation train had come off the rails. It looked as if evil had won. But then came Easter Sunday, the 1st day of the week, the 1st day of a new life, a new world, as Jesus broke the bonds of death and rose from the grave. Not even a conspiracy between Judas, Rome and the Jewish religious elite could derail God's great plan of salvation. God always finishes what he starts. It was that way with Jesus. It will be that way with us.

God always completes what he starts. He always keeps his promises. And if you can think of anything that God has begun that has not yet come to completion, then remember this: that is only the case because we haven't yet reached the end! Brothers and sisters, the work that God has begun in you he will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus. So don't give up. Don't lose hope. Don't take your eye off the prize nor your shoulder from the wheel. Continue to pursue the things of God, continue to dive daily into God's word and with his help, put into practice what you read. Continue to meet with God in prayer. Continue to meet regularly with your brothers and sisters in Christ. And God will change you more and more into the likeness of Jesus.

What God begins he always finishes.
